The topic of the most recent Parent Forum was "What's on @ Delany" at which the College presented the changes regarding teaching and learning initiated this year. One particular change involved streamlining the use of student learning spaces to provide greater flexibility and adaptability.

In reinforcing this point we invited Mr Birol Salicioglu, a current parent, to describe the changes occurring at Sydney Trains. He explained that Sydney Trains are in the process of transitioning their engineering department into a new hub comprising of agile spaces allowing for different work functions such as collaboration, presentation and reflection. Moreover, Mr Salicioglu made the connection between the changes taking place at Sydney Trains, and other workplaces with how his daughter is learning. He also was confident that his daughter would have the skills and knowledge needed to enter a workforce that is ever evolving and uncertain.

Delany College would like to congratulate Mary Ghribian from Year 10 who has been selected to travel to France and Belguim as part of a student group visiting the Western Front. This NSW government initiative included all schools across the State and Delany was nominated as one of twenty schools. Mary will be in a position to immerse herself in the spirit of ANZAC and speak to other adults and students present about their experiences. It is the school's intention that on her return, Mary will share her thoughts and stories to enhance our appreciation of the ANZAC story.

As Easter is approaching, we are constantly reminded of Christ's ultimate sacrifice and love. It is this love that gives hope to all people and a desire to live in the light of Christ. On behalf of the College Executive I would like to take this opportunity to thank all staff members and students for a successful beginning to this academic year. #### PREMIER'S ANZAC MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

#### Winner Announced



On Wednesday 29th March at our College assembly, Mr Robert Muscat, Principal, announced that the successful candidate for the scholarship is Mary Ghribian of Year 10. Mary was one of a number of outstanding candidates who presented work submissions of a very high standard to a community Panel who heard the presentations as part of a rigorous selection process.

Other exceptional candidates included Vincent Tuala, Yara Fakoua, Elizabeth Kondok and Rasha Abou Halka, all of whom received commendations for the high quality of their submissions, however only one scholarship was available.

Mary created a model reproducing three battlefields, complete with trenches, sandbags, soldiers, nurses' kit, poppies and contoured terrain. Mary added blindfolds to her miniature soldiers and explained "this is a metaphor for stepping into the unknown". Mary's soldiers were also painted different colours; "this is a metaphor for the different emotions they felt", she said. Mary also identified why it is important to commemorate and recognise past war efforts, making references to other tragedies, such as the Armenian genocide. Mary also included a Folio, illustrating the progression of ideas in her project and details of her research.

Other excellent and well thought out submissions from our highly commended students included:

- A poem, composed by the student, with the student finishing by asking the panel to join them in saying "Lest we Forget". The student also drew a portrait with very well thought out ideas, including a fallen solider with blood moving towards a (blood) red poppy; further there was an image of a woman who was grieving her lost family member looking on. Flowing out of the poppy was a drawing of a panel from the War Memorial, with red poppies placed near the names, symbolising the link to the fallen soldier.
- An artwork incorporating soldiers' letters which the student had researched. The student said "art is not what you see but what you make others see" and collated a thoughtful selection of solders' letters as primary sources. The student stained the paper with coffee; the student said that they chose coffee because it gave energy to the soldiers to stay on patrol on the battlefield. The student observed "man must put an end to war or war will put an end to mankind".
- A poem titled "Grandfather" which described a hero who
  was a 'brave man of war'. The student was very passionate
  about telling the Anzac story and stories of those fallen in
  war, making moving links to stories from other heritages
  and nationalities.
- A painted artwork on canvas. The student said "it is a shame that there is only one day in the year when we commemorate Anzac day. An artwork helps commemorate this event every day." The artwork included the image of a soldier looking over poppies on a blue background, with a self-composed poem in the corner of the canvas to illustrate Anzac imagery.

Mary has won an all-expenses paid trip to Europe in 2017, courtesy of the NSW Premier and the NSW Department of Veterans Affairs. In September, Mary will travel to Anzac sites as a representative of the NSW Government. She will travel to significant Australian battlefields in Belgium and France on a 12 day tour of the Western Front, along with students from other schools. Mary will also attend commemorative events in the town of Ypres in Belgium, acknowledging 100 years since Australia lost 38,000 men in battle there.

We look forward to hearing about her journey as she shares her experiences with her Delany community.

# ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

We find ourselves suddenly at the conclusion of Term 1. It has been a busy and bustling term of activity, celebrations, teaching and learning. The following two weeks are a time of spiritual, emotional and physical renewal in preparation for Term 2, 2017.

#### THE DELANY COMMUNITY

On Tuesday 28 March members of the school leadership team hosted a Parent information evening. The focus of the evening was our teaching and learning practices at Delany College - what these look like and why we are taking this particular approach. You should be aware that we have two new leadership positions at Delany this year - Leaders of Pedagogy. In short these two staff - Mrs Sharon McManus and Mrs Joanne McKeown - are charged with working alongside our teaching staff to introduce new practices of teaching and to work to ensure learning is effective.

During their presentation they provided this thought-provoking quote: We're all instructors to realise that the quality of mental process, not the production of correct answers, is the measure of educative growth, something hardly less than a revolution in teaching would be worked. John Dewey

We were also privleged to have Mr Birol Salicioglu (parent of a year 10 student) speak at this evening. In short, he described his new workplace as one that is very similar to that of the learning environment at Delany. His words were, in effect, that he was very confident that his daughter would be prepared for her working life ahead because of the experiences and learning she is receiving at our school.

The evening concluded with a Q & A forum. During this time there were several probing and engaging questions from our parents and (we trust) thorough and justified responses. There were questions asked that are already answered as well as questions that have opened further dialogue. I strongly encourage all parents to attend our future information evenings.

#### THE ACADEMIC COMMUNITY

Year 12 students now have approximately 10 weeks of lessons, plus two holiday blocks, to prepare for their Trial HSC examinations. This time will disappear in a blink of an eye. Our students will receive all their marked exams from last week prior to the completion of this term, and this feedback is the perfect point to revise what went right and wrong, then start preparing for future work.

Meanwhile all remaining students will be headed towards exams in term 2. Year 11 kick off this process with exams in week 2 (beginning 1 May), years 9 & 10 in week 5 (beginning 22 May) and years 7 & 8 in week 6 (beginning 29 May). Exams are only one component of assessment. Every task that is submitted (or not submitted) forms a picture of a student's learning and progress throughout the year.

#### THE PATRICIAN COMMUNITY

On Friday, the last day of Term 1, we will celebrate a short Easter liturgy. The Easter season, climaxing with the resurrection of Jesus, is the key celebration of the Catholic Church. If you would like to join our College community in prayer please give our administration staff a call to ensure we save you some space. On Thursday 6 April all staff who are new to Delany College have been invited to breakfast with Br Aengus Kavanagh. During this time Br Aengus will share the Patrician story with these staff and "induct" them into the family.

#### TERM 2 COMMENCEMENT DATE

Term 2 begins on **Monday 24 April**. In an unusual twist of the calendar our second day of Term 2 is ANZAC day which is, of course, a public holiday. All students are expected to attend school on Monday. This also means that students are to be wearing the College winter uniform. The uniform shop will be open this Thursday if you require particular winter clothing. St Patrick, pray for us.

### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

#### FROM THE PEDAGOGICAL LEADERS

Sitting up straight, in a chair that faced the front of the room, surrounded by other students, similarly sitting in very neat rows was the typical setup of the traditional classroom that most of us would remember. The rare opportunity to work with others was always greeted with excitement.

Educational research and the needs of the 21st century learner have revealed that cooperative and collaborative learning is essential for today's students. The learning spaces at Delany College certainly reflect this belief and in supporting our practice, attempt to incorporate as many opportunities for teamwork as possible.



Working in small groups, allows students to share their strengths and also develop skills they are yet to be proficient in. They develop interpersonal skills and learn to deal with conflict. Teachers ensure groups are guided by clear objectives so students engage in activities that improve their understanding of the content explored.

Other benefits include:

- learners actively participate
- teachers become learners at times, and learners sometimes teach
- respect is given to every member
- diversity is celebrated, and all contributions are valued
- students learn skills for resolving conflicts when they arise
- members draw upon their past experience and knowledge
- research tools such as Internet access are made available
- students are invested in their own learning.

Thus, group work offers students the chance to practise skills that will one day enable them to be productive members of the workforce. As we come to the end of term one, I encourage you to discuss with your child in readiness for term two, the opportunities they will have, each day to work with others and the benefits gained from such opportunities.

The day started off with a short talk by politicians including the Premier Gladys Berejiklian, Opposition Leader Luke Foley as well as local members of parliament including the Member for Granville, Julia Finn.

They answered questions concerning gender equality in the parliament, challenges that they have faced, as well as giving us leaders valuable advice and inspiration on making a change in our communities and the state for our future.

The day continued with a tour of the chamber where a bill concerning green slips was heard, as well as a short visit to the Legislative Council, where another bill was heard. # THE BIG DAY IN




# SUSTAINABLE BIOMES

As a result the Year 10 co-hort were able to learn about different biomes and now we as human beings can help our biomes to be more sustainable for the future.


