The College commemorated ANZAC day in a moving assembly that involved RSL members and current serving ADF personnel. Lt. Col Francis of the Parramatta Lancers and Mr Barry Bullivant, President of the RSL Sub-Branch Granville addressed the community about the meaning of the ANZAC heritage and its relevance today. In particular Mr Bullivant made reference to the ANZAC spirit, forged by the heroic actions of the soldiers at Gallipoli, in relation to what we can learn and adopt in our lives. He described events when these soldiers shared mateship, adaptability and resourcefulness which became capabilities that would shape and define the nature of the Australian digger during and after the war.

Students and Staff were reminded that although Gallipoli is over 100 years old, we can still reflect on the significance of the campaign and its legacy in nurturing a nation that values respect, friendship and humour.

COMMEMORATING ANZAC DAY

The College ANZAC Day Service also officially launched the ANZAC Memorial and Photo Essay, funded under the Australian Government's ANZAC Centenary Local Grants Program.

Invited guests in attendance were Mr Barry Bullivant OAM, President of Granville RSL Sub Branch, Mrs June Bullivant OAM, Mr Harry Stephens, Historian, Mrs Susan Russell, Descendant of WWI Veteran (with husband Mr Barry Russell), Mr John Fairweather, Descendant of WWI Veteran, Mr Roger Apte, Sculptor/Designer of ANZAC Memorial and Lieutenant Colonel Scott Francis, Commanding Officer, Parramatta

Mr Barry Bullivant delivered an inspiring address exhorting students to imitate the values of the ANZACs, such as courage, mateship and loyalty.

Lieutenant Colonel Scott Francis also addressed the assembly. He told the students: "The reputation for reliability and doing what is right, regardless of the personal cost, has been the hallmark of Australians in all conflicts we have been involved in. And as society in general seems to be losing the values so dearly won over the last 101 years, it is more important than ever that we as a community, and you as the leaders of tomorrow, strive to maintain the standards set by the original ANZACs."

CURRICULUM

At the end of Term 1 Yr12 completed their Half Yearly Exams, Yr11 are currently completing their half yearly exams, Yr 7 and 9 will complete the National NAPLAN tests and in week 5 this term, Yr9 and 10 will complete their half yearly exams.

As a parent it sometimes seems overwhelming watching your children complete all requirements for school assessments. It can be even harder to understand why they need to complete them.

Assessments are designed to allow a student to demonstrate their understanding of the skills and knowledge that has been studied in class. Most of the time an assessment task allows each child to demonstrate that understanding in various ways and formats. At Delany we use the data from HSC exams, NAPLAN and other internal data to help us work out how to help each student improve their results. One way we have noted is we need to help our students write with more flair and sophistication. We have also noticed that we need to help our students deal with the time

constraints and stresses involved in completing an exam block in plenty of time before the HSC exams. LEGAL STUDIES STUDENTS VISIT THE COURTS

On 5th April, Year 11 Legal Studies students visited the Supreme and Local Courts in Sydney. At the Supreme Court, students completed their first task of passing through the security scanners, to be met by the Registrar who hosted the visit.

Students were informed that they were very fortunate – they would be allowed to watch Her Honour Natalie Adams being sworn in as NSW's newest Supreme Court Judge. Her Honour's passage from school student to Judge was an inspirational account to hear, surrounded by Her Honour's family, friends and members of the legal profession (as well as 10 Delany College students seated at the back). 40 Judges in one room wearing their red robes was quite a sight!

The Registrar then invited students to sit in the Supreme Court and hear some bail hearings. Students watched a 19 year old Indigenous male who was being held in custody apply for bail. Following debate, the Judge finally granted the accused youth bail, but with strict conditions. The Judge said he was mindful of the high rates of incarceration of Indigenous youth, but warned him not to breach his bail conditions.

Later students went to the District Court but quickly realised that numerous police were closely monitoring a gang trial being held there - so the decision was made to visit the Local Court up the road instead.

At the Local Court students watched a range a matters, including one where Queensland Detectives wanted an order to take a male, who they had in custody, to Queensland for investigation. It was clearly a serious matter, and the Court ordered that the handcuffed man be extradited with them.

There was a further matter, where a man sitting in his green prison overalls in a cell in Goulburn Supermax Prison had asked the Magistrate for bail via video-link. He was being held because of a serious charge of drug trafficking. The man's lawyer took the unusual tactic of trying to argue that the police scientist had erroneously included the weight of the glass measuring jar when recording the drugs; therefore she argued that the weight of the drugs her client possessed was less serious than stated on the charge sheet. The Magistrate had no sympathy for this idea, dismissed the argument, and refused the man bail.

Students were also taken into an empty court room and given an informative talk by a helpful Court Officer, eager to ensure that students gained the most from their visit. Instead of the usual formal bowing when entering and leaving the Court room,

nervously trying to not displease the Judge, students could sit where they liked and see close up the functions of the room.

Delany students were at all times respectful and showed appreciation for the opportunity to see the legal system in operation.

TRANSPORT FOR NSW

RE: SCHOOL OPAL CARDS/BUS PASSES

Almost 340,000 school students are now travelling to and from school using their new School Opal cards.

If a student gets a "Card not valid – 65" message, they are not approved for that service and should go online at transportnsw.info/school-students to request an update of operator(s).

Customers who currently have a School Term Bus Pass, that is due to expire after term one, will also receive an email notification from Transport for NSW reminding them to renew their pass. These customers simply need to go online at transportnsw.info/school-students and apply for a new School Term Bus Pass, and their existing School Opal card will be updated if the application is submitted and approved prior to the start of Term 2.
