Research shows that parents have a major influence on a child's achievement. According to a handout prepared by the US National Parent Teacher Association (PTA), when parents are involved, regardless of income or background, children are more likely to succeed academically, attend school regularly, have better social skills, show improved behaviour and go on to post-secondary education.

Essential to achieving meaningful parental engagement is the parent-school community partnership. Delany College is committed to working with parents on their involvement by developing strategies that welcome all families, promote effective communication, support student success and create community events.

Most often, a result of strong parent-school-community partnership is increased parent involvement at home.

Two particular key practices are:

- Modeling the value of learning.
- Expressing high but realistic expectations for achievement.

Furthermore, here are some specific ways parents can support their children at home:

- 1. Set an example by reading at home.
- 2. Play games together than require planning ahead and problem solving (e.g. Scrabble).
- 3. Communicate openly.
- 4. Encourage your child to work hard in school.
- 5. Regularly discuss education and careers.
- 6. Ensure your child attends school everyday.
- 7. Regularly affirm your child's personal worth through positive messages




Our congratulations are extended to Chloe Zaiter.

3 years.



DIOCESAN SOCIAL JUSTICE LAUNCH


"As a christian community we are called to reach one another". These were the lovely words spoken by the new Parramatta Dioceses Bishop, Bishop Vincent Long on the 12th of October, 2016 at a Social Justice Event held at St Patricks Cathedral Hall partaken by year 9 students, Matelita Senivatalala, Irene Juru, Vincent Tuala, myself and our teacher Ms Magistrado.





On the day of arrival we were greeted by an introduction of what the annual social justice event was going to be about. This year the arising topic was based on 'Social Justice in an Ageing Society', 'a place at the table' announced by Sister Louise. This was further explained through the message from Mr Gregory Whitby in saying "Being a saint doesn't mean your perfect, it means you're just on the right path to becoming a leader". In the context of the event, this meant helping and supporting the elderly though many different parts and aspects in schooling and individual life. This is a right path, and a path to becoming a leader.

Through the powerful words of Mr Whitby, the foundation in which the day focused on, the event continued through the words of Bishop Vincent Long saying "We must realise our gratitude to the elderly" and the fact that "The church must come together including the elderly and youth". The unity of the elderly and youth was spoken of, and directed to all the students present to make us come to our sense that "we are the future" and that the "elderly are the mirror of the suffering Jesus Christ". Which in hindsight allowed our eyes, mind and heart to open to help the elderly, as in each one of them lay Jesus Christ inside and if we as the youth, we the future ignore, what God is asking us to do, then we are technically ignoring our faith and Jesus Christ too.



Further, on the day each one of us present in the hall were asked to complete a statement breakdown, whether that be a bible passage, a quote from the pope or other. This was actively and cohesively completed as a team to make a further link and understanding of how this relates to the elderly. To open the empathetic and sympathetic side of each individual we watched a video reflecting the elderly and their struggles and benefits to the world. As a Delany team we took out many words and statements that were in relation to the social justice video, such as the need to be "compassionate, appreciative and have gratitude" towards the elderly especially because many believe that in this economic state they are "slow and unproductive" which is certainly not the case.



Then we were made as a school team to cooperatively discuss ideas of how our school can incorporate some of the elderly in our everyday school routine and so we had ideas of allowing them to join in school events and be guest speakers for many school assemblies. This was later agreed on by Irene Juru saying "You have to start somewhere to finish or somewhere else". Talking as a group a lady named Ms Rayella Haines addressed us on the importance of the inclusion of the elderly. I believe that drew the sympathetic side out of many of us, as she was saying that , "Many old people have nothing to look forward to, so young people give them a reason to look forward everyday." In addition, "Many elderly people feel as though they do not have a voice therefore need someone to talk to."

The social justice event finally concluded with Luke Tobin making a metaphorical gesture with money in comparison to the elderly. Even though Mr. Tobin tampered with the note, stomped on the note and scrunched it up he taught us that it is still \$20. So that is in the same way with people, including the elderly, even though they may look or are different they are all people, living life and should be respected.

As a collective this taught us that we must avoid ageism and stereo types and to value the elderly as "The wisdom and experience of older people is a resource of inestimable worth. Recognising and treasuring the contributions of older people is essential to the long term flourishing of any society".
