





non-ATAR - options other than direct to university


Who should consider non-ATAR?

The Higher School Certificate

- is the culmination of a student's school career
- is the highest educational award that can be achieved at secondary school in New South Wales
- reports student achievement in terms of a standard achieved in individual courses
- presents a profile of student achievement across a broad range of subjects



HSC Course Structure

- All courses in the HSC have a unit value
- Most courses are 2 units which equates to 120 hours of study and an HSC result out of 100
- Some courses are 1 unit. This is equivalent to 60 hours of study and a HSC result out of 50
- Many 1 unit courses are extension courses, enabling 3 or 4 units of a course to be studied



Requirements for the HSC

Year 11

- minimum of 12 units
- students must satisfactorily complete the Year 11 course before commencing the corresponding Year 12 course

Year 12

minimum of 10 units



Requirements for the HSC

Both the Year 11 and Year 12 pattern of study must include:

- 2 units of compulsory English
- at least 6 units of Board Developed Courses
- at least 3 courses of 2 units value or greater
- at least 4 subjects (including English)
- a maximum of 6 units of Science may be included in the Year 11 pattern of study.
- from 2019, a maximum of 7 units of Science may be included in the Year 12 pattern of study.

SATISFACTORY COMPLETION OF A COURSE

Students must:

- follow the course developed or endorsed by NESA
- apply themselves with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school, and
- achieve some or all of the course outcomes

VET Board Developed Courses require students to complete mandatory work placement



ADDITIONAL COMPLETION REQUIREMENTS FOR HSC COURSES

Students must:

- complete HSC assessment tasks that contribute in excess of 50 per cent of available marks in courses where internal assessment marks are submitted, and
- sit for and make a serious attempt at any requisite
 Higher School Certificate examinations for a course



HSC: All My Own Work

- HSC: All My Own Work is a mandatory program designed to help HSC students to follow the principles and practices of good scholarship.
- It consists of five modules:
 - Scholarship Principles and Practices
 - Acknowledging Sources
 - Plagiarism
 - Copyright
 - Working with Others

- do not have HSC examinations and so do not contribute to the calculation of an ATAR








HSC Record of Achievement

A Statement of Attainment ~ Listing all units of competency achieved towards the qualification







- is a rank NOT a mark
- provides information about how a student performs overall in relation to other students



Health Services Assistance (NURSING)







- 2 Units Prelim + 4 Units HSC
- Counts towards ATAR (Exam)
- 1 x 4 hour block per week
- Clinical blocks at Hospital for placement.
- HLT33115 Certificate III in Health Services Assistance
- Work closely with hospital staff in training facilities.
 - NEPEAN / BLACKTOWN / AUBURN
- Students who complete this course and gain Band 4 or higher in English are offered a place at selected universities to continue with degree.

Cluster Courses

- Held on Tuesday / Wednesday/Thursday afternoons each week.
- Delivered as a block (approx 3 hours)
- Students are transported to their host school via mini bus.
- Bus is free.
- Students make their own way home.

EXTERNAL PROVIDER VET COURSES (eVET)

Delivered at various TAFE campuses AND private training organisations around Sydney.

One afternoon per week approx: 1:30 – 5:00pm OR Block delivery Costs covered by CEO Parramatta BUT students will be required to pay a \$250 admin fee per year plus a \$250 bond, which is refunded on completion of the course. If CEO funding is unavailable, then it becomes user pays – cost: \$1200 - \$3500.

- Gain 2 units towards your HSC.
- Counts towards your ATAR.

- Opportunities for advancement into leadership / managerial work.
- Qualify for Industry Based Learning (2 units of your HSC)


