Advent begins Sunday, 1st December 2013, and ends Tuesday, 24 December 2013.

Hope, Peace, Love, Joy. The Birth of Christ

"For the great human family, it is necessary to renew always the common horizon toward which we are journeying. **The horizon of hope!** This is the horizon that makes a good journey. The time of Advent that we begin again today returns us to the horizon of hope, a hope that does not disappoint because it is founded on the Word of God. A hope that does not disappoint, simply because the Lord never disappoints! He is faithful!"

Pope Francis said Dec. 1 to the crowds in St. Peter's Square.

We are reminded by the Church that the season of Advent is a time of expectancy – we are to prepare with joy in our hearts for the coming of Christ (Catechism of the Catholic Compendium, no 102).

The word Advent is from the Latin *adventus* for "coming" and is associated with the four weeks of preparation for Christmas. Advent always contains four Sundays, beginning on the Sunday nearest the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle, (November 30) and continuing until December 24. It blends together a penitential spirit, very similar to Lent, a liturgical theme of preparation for the Second and Final Coming of the Lord, called the *Parousia*, and a joyful theme of getting ready for the Bethlehem event. The traditional colour of Advent is purple or violet which symbolizes the penitential spirit.

Loving God, we thank you for your gift of love shown to us perfectly in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Help us prepare our hearts to receive him. Help us to hear and to do your word. We say it in the name of the One born in Bethlehem. Amen.

SCHOOL OF COMMUNITY LANGUAGES

Information about the Saturday School of Community

Languages:

The Saturday School of Community Languages (SSCL) is a Department of Education and Training secondary school that offers language courses to students wishing to study their background language. Students are eligible to enrol if the language requested is **their background** community language and the language is not available at our school.

The SSCL offers 25 languages at 14 centres in Sydney, for the Record of School Achievement (ROSA) and Higher School Certificate level, and the school operates only on Saturdays, thus enabling all interested high school students to attend.

The languages available for study through the SSCL are:

Delany students at SSCL:

For over a number of years, Delany College has had many students studying their community language at Saturday School. While all these students work on improving their skills in their own background languages, the students in Years 10, 11 and 12 also have the advantage of including their language as part of their Record of School Achievement and Higher School Certificate courses.

Undertaking to study a language at the Saturday School while in Years 11 and 12, offers further **benefits:** It will free the students from an elective line and allow them extra time in a study-group, which in turn will enable the students to access support in order to meet their learning needs. Studying this extra language also places the students in a better position to take advantage of employment opportunities.



It is noteworthy to state that in previous years, a number of HSC students from Delany who studied their community language at Saturday School achieved either a Band 6 or a Band 5 for these 2 Unit courses.

We would encourage other students to apply in order to study their community language at Saturday School.

New enrolments for 2014:

Applications should reach the SSCL before the 18th of December 2014.

In 2014, classes at the Saturday School will commence on Saturday, the 8th of February 2014. The formal enrolment period ends on Friday the 21st of February, 2014, so please submit applications as soon as possible, otherwise documentary evidence as proof of prior learning would be required for those enrolling students who are in Years 10, 11 and 12.

PLEASE NOTE: Since 2010 HSC Heritage Courses have been offered for study in Chinese, Japanese and Korean. These courses are aimed at students who do have a background in the language but are not of a proficient enough level to do the HSC Background Speakers course. There are strict eligibility criteria for these courses. Classes fill quickly for these courses so it advisable to apply as soon as possible if you wish to enrol.

If your child is interested in enrolling in their background language at Saturday School for 2014 please contact Mrs. Prasad (go to the front office) in order to obtain an enrolment form.

This needs to be filled out and returned to Mrs. Prasad as soon as possible.
