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A Year of Celebration!!!!

We have had so much to celebrate this year, including a significant anniversary, academic successes, national acknowledges and unprecedented fundraising initiatives.

St Patrick's Day marked a special milestone in the history of the school. We acknowledged 75 years of Catholic education on the Granville site, from its Patrician beginnings in 1942 to its most recent manifestation as a coeducational Years 7-12 comprehensive school. We were fortunate to have many Patrician bothers, including Br Paul O'Keeffe, the Provincial, and Br Peter Ryan, Congregational Leader, present, as well as former, Principals, other dignitaries, and friends and families of the College. Fr Paul, who presided over the Mass, did a marvellous job in engaging the students in understanding the significance of the Patrician charism, and its impact on the lives of so many young men and women.

Following on from that memorable occasion, the College was nominated and won the 2017 Innovative Schools Award, a nationally recognised prize, which highlighted our innovative mindset and achievements. This is a most prestigious award that is a testament to the hard work of our leaders and teachers in providing creative learning opportunities.

We farewelled Mary Ghribian, who was selected as part of a student group to visit sites along the Western Front to commemorate the 100th anniversary of World War I. The NSW Premier officially invited Mary and the other nineteen students across the State to hear stories of courage and horror, and reflect on the emergence of the ANZAC spirit.

We were extremely proud of our students in Term 3 this year, having collected close to \$7000 towards the Delany Foundation. This money will be used to fund building projects, health programmes and educational initiatives in countries, like Ghana, India, Papua New Guinea and Sri Lanka.

I take this opportunity to thank the College Leadership Team for its support and energy over the year, as well as our middle leaders and teaching staff for their dedication and enthusiasm. I am deeply grateful to the Support staff for their commitment and care shown to our student and families.

Finally, I thank parents and friends to the College for entrusting your son and daughter to our care, and look forward to continuing our partnership in 2018.

Throughout this year we have had more and more parents offering to assist in various functions that are running at the College. During Term 3 we had a very successful parent meeting to discuss the vision and mission of the College through to 2020.

In Term 4 several parents of Year 7 students met with parents of incoming students for 2018 to provide a network of support. These two simple examples demonstrate the support of our parent community, as well as the opportunities for all parent and carers to be involved in the College.

Congratulations to our 2017 student leadership team. The team was headed by Hilary Lim and Wesley Swalah Mcdahrou, and right from Term 4 of 2016 they led with distinction. Their team did not let them down, either, and together they played an important role in the student community.

There was an enormous effort throughout the year to broaden our community to include our local Catholic primary schools. In total we have hosted approximately 400 students from Years 5 and 6. They participated in Learning Days and the Delany Debating competition. Behind the scenes many, many staff and students have contributed their time and energy to making every one of these days successful.

THE ACADEMIC COMMUNITY

The focus of all our efforts is the academic improvement of students.

The highlight of the academic year is always the Year 12 graduation, during which we acknowledge the results of six years of work and effort.

Congratulations to Elisar Salameh who was awarded the Dux of the College for 2017, and also to the many students who were awarded recognition in their various fields of excellence. Once HSC exams are out of the way, the nervous wait begins as students await their results. We wish every graduating student the very best for their future endeavours.

Our students will have begun to see a slight change in teaching and learning practice this year, and we expect this to accelerate in 2018. The focus of learning is moving to an enquiry-based model, where students are asked to investigate how skills and competencies of their school curriculum are applied to real-life situations. As the new year unfolds, students, as well as parents when they assist with homework, will be asked to make connections to community, business, research and projects.

THE PATRICIAN COMMUNITY

Delany College is, first and foremost, a Catholic school in the Patrician tradition. The highlight of 2017 was the celebration on 17 March of the College's 75th Anniversary. It was a day on which we remembered that the school was founded by just three Patrician Brothers in 1942 and has grown from there. We were doubly blessed that one of these original teachers, Mr Budin (Br Vincent) was present at our celebration. Since that time he has passed away and is surely on his way to heaven.

Another highlight was our fundraising effort for the Delany Foundation. This is an organisation established to provide financial assistance to those Patrician communities that are just starting their schools (just like Delany in 1942) in other countries including Ghana and India. In an amazing effort, our staff and students ran all sorts of activities to raise \$6894. I had the great honour of presenting this cheque to Br Paul O'Keefe, who was left quite literally speechless. This is quite a large amount of money in Australia, but it goes much,

PEDAGOGICAL LEADERS' REPORT

Leading through learning is a primary focus for all teachers in our Delany community. Research into current pedagogical practice has signalled a shift in the way that knowledge and learning are conducted by our teachers, and as a result, the instructional practices they choose to use within the classroom have changed.

In addressing these trends, all staff at Delany have this year reflected on their current practice and evaluated it within the context of 21st Century learning skills that are embedded in the Patrician tradition.


These include the "4Cs" capabilities of:

- Collaboration
- Creativity
- Critical thinking and
- ▶ Communication

The 20/20/20 Model used by teachers within the spaces at Delany is based on the Gradual Release of Responsibility Model developed by Douglas Fischer, Ph.D and Nancy Frey, Ph.D. This instructional model requires that the teacher, by design, transition from assuming all the responsibility for performing a task to a situation in which the student assumes all of the responsibility.

RELIGIOUS CO ORDINATOR REPORT






















RELIGIOUS EDUCATION







Timber Products and Furniture Technologies

In Industrial Technology, students develop their skills to design and produce a range of timber furniture projects. Industrial Technology develops a student's ability to be creative and to solve problems as they work through their projects. By the time a student reaches Year 12, they have the ability to design and make a Major Project for their Higher School Certificate, using the skills that they have gained throughout their previous years' projects.

STAGE 5

In Stage 5 classes, student projects include: a small box, a breadboard with a drawer, a small table. Students are provided with a base design and are given the task to modify the design to make it their own. They also have the challenge of working out how they will construct their design.

















STAGE 6

In Stage 6 classes, students create more advanced projects incorporating a higher level of skill, further developing what they have learnt in previous years. Year 11 Projects include a bedside table and a trinket box.

Year 12 students design and create a piece of furniture for their Higher School Certificate. This year, student's major projects included: Study desks, a coffee table, a buffet, jewellery boxes, an entertainment unit and a dining room table.

The NSW Law Society Mock Trial Competition provides 'court room' scenarios for students to increase their debating and advocacy skills by competing against other schools. This year the team was ably led by Mrs Donia Shwan and the full report can be read separately in the 2017 Yearbook.

GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK EXCURSIONS

As part of learning about environmental sustainability, Year 10 students attended an excursion to Penrith Lakes, where they undertook fieldwork and proposed strategies to manage land and water resources.


PREMIER'S ANZAC MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP 2017

STEM



STEM is an educational program developed to prepare primary and secondary students for college and graduate study in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). In addition to subject-specific learning, STEM aims to foster inquiring minds, logical reasoning and collaboration skills.

At Delany this year we have trialled a few STEM initiatives in preparation for 2018, including robotics, game development and coding. Unity Gaming ran their "Main Event" at Delany where students were given the opportunity to learn about coding for games and apps. Unity is an industry standard software programme used to make many well-known games and apps. We are looking forward to engaging with more STEM initiatives in 2018.



MATHEMATICS

This year has proven to be a great year for Mathematics at Delany. With the staff working tirelessly throughout the year, students were provided with a variety of learning experiences, including the introduction of *Algebros*.

We identified that our students needed additional support outside the timetabled Mathematics lessons to ask questions about the content. These afternoon sessions ran once a week for Term 4 and saw many students dedicate additional time to their Mathematics studies.

SCIENCE

In the lab, students were inspired and challenged through passionate delivery of scientific content. At a senior level, Year 12 Biology focused on understanding how we as biological entities exist and interact with our world. Along with practical experiments of dissecting brains and eyes, we investigated biological concepts first hand. Excursions to Featherdale Wildlife Park and The Museum of Human Diseases at UNSW were exciting and enriching experiences for the students.

Students were very fortunate to have been provided with ongoing guidance throughout the year. A big thank you to the STEM teachers.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

This year the students experienced a range of exciting and insightful opportunities in PDHPE. Year 8 was also fortunate enough to attend a *Surf Educate Australia* program at Manly Beach. They were taught all about safe surf on the beach and developed skills around safety and protection when in the water.











SPORT, LIFESTYLE & RECREATION

Year 11 SLR also attended a *Lifesaving and Swimming Program* which covered swimming and rescue strokes, Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, commonly called CPR, plus survival and rescue techniques. All of the students had a great day and learnt much about the different facets of swimming and lifesaving.



CHILD STUDIES

Students in Year 9 and 10 elective subject, Child Studies, excelled in a range of highly relevant, innovative and engaging lessons. The fantastic work the students produced is a credit to their hard work and dedication and their overall passion for the subject. The learning year consisted of Skype sessions, excursions, Project Based Learning, technology tasks, creating toys, making play dough and caring for the electronic baby. Students have been working from the learning platform, Google Classroom, and learning experiences have been provided on a Google Site and the application, Seesaw.





YEAR 7

Year 7 enjoyed an eventful year with practical activities. Students were exposed to participation in selected sporting activities and developed confidence and competence in movement skills, especially fundamental and specialised movement skills. Finally, the students extended their awareness of the importance of participating in physical activities and its influence on living a healthy and productive lifestyle.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION & TRAINING



CONSTRUCTION

In what is traditionally a male-dominated industry, our Construction classes have had several female students join the subject. This has been possible because the subject has been run with Mr Casey as a cluster course, meaning that students from other schools, that can't offer this subject have sent their students to Delany College.

Construction students have had to complete two weeks of work placement as a mandatory part of the qualification. Some of the very large development companies, such as Dyldam and DevelopCorp, as well as a number of smaller groups like Pirri Innovations and Urban Apartments, have generously given their time and resources to provide the students with a real experience of this industry.

As well as receiving a Certificate II in Construction, students also qualified for the WorkSafe White Card that is required for the students to enter a worksite. Students were able to travel to the Catholic Trade Training Centre at McCarthy, and to take advantage of the many resources available to carry out training and assessment in bricklaying and blocklaying.

To further enhance the delivery of competencies for next year, we have added some new equipment, including laser levels and concreting tools.



HOSPITALITY

Like the Construction Course, this subject was a cluster class, hosting students from St Paul's Greystanes. This cohort is the last group going through studying the commercial cookery version of the subject. Next year will be Hospitality Food and Beverage, which basically means working 'front of house'.

Two of the new competencies in this course will involve Espresso Coffee and Non-alcoholic beverages. To prepare for this, the VET kitchen has had a commercial espresso coffee machine installed. Ms Karim, the Hospitality teacher, and several other staff have recently received training in the operation of this new equipment. The kitchen is also being stocked with resources that will help train our students in the making of non-alcoholic cocktails, milkshakes and juices.

Students have been completing their work placements this year and have had the opportunity to work for two weeks at the local clubs and cafés in the Parramatta area.

INFORMATION & DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY

The Information and Digital Technology VET course is all about building websites, operating software packages and maintaining computer systems. Ms Lennon has been training and assessing her students in these three areas and students will come away with a Statement of Attainment in Information and Digital technology.

Although Work Placement is difficult to find, the students have finally been placed in several companies whose work spans from retail systems to PC refurbishment to IT services.

Students who successfully complete this course are able to apply at the end of Year 12 for ICT traineeships through the Catholic Education office at Parramatta.



EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION & CARE

This is the first group to go through this course and it has brought students together from four different schools to study for the qualification in Early Childhood Education and Care.

We have a new teacher, Ms Natalie Roberts, who has worked very hard to set up our special space and provide the students with an exciting training program. When you enter the ECEC learning area, you find yourself in a space specially designed for this industry area, with change tables, children's toys, bright colours and posters.

Students have visited our local childcare facility and were able to spend an afternoon working with the staff and children. This also prepared the students for their work placement by giving them a glimpse of the type of environment they would be working in. A great deal of excitement was created when the students were able to work with the computerised infant mannequins. Tasks such as changing nappies and correctly handling 0-2 year olds were practised and assessed using the life-size equipment.

Placements for this course were completed at the local childcare facilities, and all the students did a very professional job.



ROTARY VET AWARDS

This year saw the third running of the Rotary VET Awards evening, which was held at the Northmead Performing Arts High School. The Rotary clubs in the Parramatta area present certificates to students to recognise high achievement in their VET subject. Delany College had two students presented that night.

BROTHER DOMINIC COATES LEARNING CENTRE This year has seen the full library moving into the area which was previously the Senior Study Centre. LAW SOCIETY OF NSW COMPETITION

Having the privilege of acting in the role of a solicitor or barrister (even in a mock court) can be a very exciting and life changing experience. During this competition, our students were scored according to their ability to present convincing arguments, memorise scripts and persuade an audience. They needed to do this respectfully and in a professional manner. In all these areas, they excelled.

The Delany College team in 2017 included Mary Ghribian, Marie Peralta, Jasmine Diab, Vincent Tuala, Yara Fakoua, Marie Peralta, Aiden Dagher, Chanel Chamoun, Chanel Wehbe and Mahmutjahn Olca who learned some of the skills necessary to be part of a legal team. With such an enthusiastic cohort of students, it was clear that Delany College would provide strong competition for schools in the Western Sydney region.

For the first scoring round, Delany competed against Girraween High School. For weeks before the mock court due to be held, the team diligently practised, revised and constructed their case. Delany College won by 10 points (148 to 158), an excellent result for a team of students who (all but one) had never experienced Mock Trial before. Further, we were privileged to have had a Children's Court Magistrate from Parramatta preside over the trial and provide feedback to the students.

Overall, the evening was excellent for all students involved in Mock Trial, giving Delany College the confidence to excel in their next round, having experienced success following a very challenging first round.

For the second scoring round, Delany students competed against Northmead Creative and Performing Arts High School. Delany College tied on points against Northmead. Delany College won the case, showing the students' understanding of the standard of proof in a legal matter and the elements needed to convince a court. Delany College students received accolades for their public speaking skills and perseverance in a round that could have easily received a different result.

In the third scoring round, Delany students competed against Marsden High School. The students in 2017 gave much time and energy towards representing the College and received high compliments from each visiting Magistrate for their preparation. However, Delany was defeated by 2 points (234 to 236) a feat that demonstrated the brilliance of Delany students. I would like to thank Mrs Jennifer Venhuizen (HSIE Leader of Learning), together the wider College community, for their support and encouragement.

The aim of Reading Enrichment at Delany College is to increase the opportunity for selected students in Years 7-9 to engage with and respond to texts that are commensurate with their reading age, and extend their reading and writing through the provision of challenging texts.

Data, such as NAPLAN, PAT- R and the Delany Tracking Base, were used to determine the selection of students, and this was cross-referenced with anecdotal observations from English teachers.

Paul McDonald, the owner and leading consultant from The Children's Bookshop, Beecroft assisted with text selection, of which some are presented below:

Paul was our guest speaker to launch the program, where he presented a slide show and many examples of outstanding contemporary young adult fiction. This highly engaging presentation was a fantastic way to begin, especially since he distributed many books as prizes. Students were then asked to join our Reading Enrichment Google Classroom, and select a book from our school library. Each student was provided with blank paper and string and asked to read the book during the holidays, before returning their 'Blind date with a book' to the library.

The adolescent author, J. C Burke was invited as a guest presenter for 2017 Book Week, and covered topics, such as:

- generating interest as an author;
- writing like a reader; and
- reading like a writer.







REFRAMING READERS RESOURCEFULLY

Reading may be the single most important skill for anyone to learn. It is a lifelong ability that is used and applied in our everyday life, acting as our portal in achieving knowledge. Without it, one will struggle to pass through that portal and in turn, may face difficulties in life.

Delany College was nominated by the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) to be a part of an exciting new literacy intervention program currently being piloted across schools within the diocese.

R3 is a comprehension-focus intervention program with the main purpose being to provide students with additional literacy knowledge and skills. The course allows students to read strategically and successfully comprehend texts that they have read.

Texts are selected using the curriculum and the personal interests of the student. This allows students to connect on a deeper level with what they are reading.

Students in R3 have gained immense improvement and knowledge with their reading and comprehension. They have increased their levels of understanding of texts and frequently use inferencing to help decode and draw conclusions. R3 students have also elevated their level of expression and apply appropriate pacing and speed while reading. In addition, they have developed an increase to their vocabulary and an appreciation for a variety of literature that exists.

Above all, their confidence within themselves and their learning has been lifted.


DELANY DAY

Delany proudly supports this foundation by organising fund raising events. This year Delany raised \$6,000.






